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DEVELOPMENT AND TRANSPORTATION COMMITTEE (DTC)

Staying Informed: What's happening in my community?

One of the challenges in any community is keeping residents informed about what is happening around them. This applies to anything from construction to development changes or land use amendments. That's where the Brentwood Community Association Development and Transportation Committee (DTC) plays a valuable role.

What role does the DTC play in Planning decisions?

Although the DTC has no formal authority in planning matters, we are circulated on every Discretionary Development Permit (DP) submitted to the City. That means that our group reviews the plans for every proposed development, and then provide comments and community context to the City of Calgary planning team.

Many members of our group have participated in planning sessions run by the Federation of Calgary Communities (FCC). The FCC holds classes on a variety of planning topics and provides background information to us related to reviewing a DP. For example, a recent walking class featured a walking tour of Bridgeland, highlighting both accessibility and affordable housing. On one part of the tour, we looked at how sidewalks and curb ramps could be built so that wheelchair users could navigate more easily. Seeing examples in other communities helps us to evaluate or comment on similar items that we might see in our community, and that helps us in our DP reviews.

What role do residents play in Planning decisions?

Residents should have a say in what is going to be built around them. The DTC writes up and delivers a Neighbour Notification to residents closest to a proposed new development (a secondary suite, a new building, a change of property use or a home-based business). We started writing Neighbour Notifications in 2017 when it became apparent that residents were often not aware of a development proposed near them and didn't know that they were allowed to submit their comments on that application.

Residents can submit their comments directly to the file manager at the City of Calgary Planning Department. It is also very helpful to us if the comments are also copied to the Brentwood Community Association and the DTC. Why? Because the DTC is representing the community, so we want to make sure we hear from you.

When we submit a response to the City on any DP, we first look at the responses or comments we've received from our residents. We may then contact the file manager and

ensure that those comments are taken into account, and we also include this feedback in our written review. All comments have to be of a Planning nature (for example, dealing with height or setbacks, and not things like renters versus owners).

How can residents stay informed?

1. The DTC link on the Brentwood Community Association website - <https://developments.brentwoodcommunity.com/>

We post all DPs on this site, as well as other information such as Planning-related surveys. Under the Archived DPs, you can find information about approved DPs such as the building currently being built at the old car wash site near the LRT. We try to post information of interest to the community, so check it out! You can also enter Brentwood Community Association into a browser to get the CA site, then look under Developments for the DTC site.

2. Development Permit (DP) or Change of Land Use postings on site. These are the signs that you might see on a signboard on the property next to you. They are there to let you know that changes will be happening on that site, and there is information on the sign indicating where you can obtain further details or submit comments.

3. Subscribe to Council News in Brief. These are short summaries on the major issues that have been before City Council. Each summary is only one paragraph in length, and you can click on the title to get more detailed information. This is a good way to keep track of what's been happening, although it only reports after the fact. Enter "Calgary Council News in Brief" into a search engine or go to <http://www.calgary.ca/citycouncil/Pages/CouncilWardNewsBrief.aspx>

4. You'll find a link to sign up to receive the updates, typically every few weeks.

5. Engage Calgary. This is a City of Calgary website at engage.calgary.ca with a list of city-wide projects that you can comment on, such as parking reviews or smoking in public spaces. You can also view more information, the background and updates for each project. It's a readable site that lets you simply click to find out more about current city issues and proposals, and then lets you submit your comments.

The constant hum of bees hovering over the flowers of the high bush cranberry (see photo) in the sunny hours is also a welcome and encouraging sign after a long and cold winter.

We finally had great weather for our cleanup day on June 8th and we had a wonderful turnout from the gardeners. Fortunately, the ground was soft because of all of the rain and as a result the weeds were more easily extracted. Several perennials required pruning and special thanks go to Bev Espenant, one of our new members with the gardening expertise and all the right tools for the task at hand, to Marcia Coueslan, who tackled weeding the iris bed—always a daunting task—and to Crystal Rhyno and Lori Finley. A big thank you also goes to Garry Morrison, Logan Murdoch, and Matt Robichaud for their efforts in removing the compost bin contents, mixing them and then replacing them in the bins. Managing compost can be quite labour intensive as the decomposing material must be monitored and turned on a regular basis for optimal results. However, at the end of the morning session, the garden looked very tidy and well groomed, a fitting reward for all the gardeners' efforts.

Unfortunately, we lost a few plants to the cold winter, including one of the barberry bushes, the Echinacea plant, some of the ground cover plants, and one of the Valentine cherry bushes. The latter has some growth at the ground level so will likely recover in a few years. One of our Carmine Jewel cherry bushes is also struggling but will be monitored before its future is decided. Forward into summer!

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Sod Turning for Quinterra Legacy Garden

It was a time of sorrow mixed with joy, of sadness blended with optimism, of looking back yet moving ahead. All of these emotions were evident at the June 12 sod turning for the Quinterra Legacy Garden to be established at South Glenmore Park just off 90 Ave at 24 St. SW.

Regular readers of my column will recall that I wrote about the Quinterra Legacy Garden (QLG) in the June 2019 edition. At that time, I explained that this Garden will honour the five young people who were killed at a Brentwood home in April 2014.

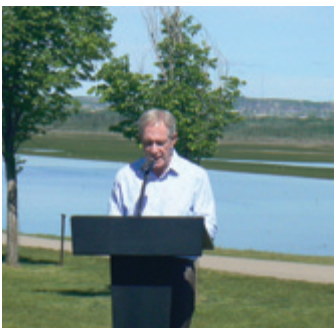
Before and after the sod turning, musical background was provided by the Brocke String Quartet from Mount Royal University.

Channel 7's Tony Tighe was emcee for this event. Tony first introduced Bruce and Deanna Starlight of the Tsuu Tina First Nation. Bruce spoke movingly of "also having lost our daughter at a young age"; while Deanna—looking ahead to the completed QLG as a place of contemplation and peace—observed that "we all need a place to sit". On behalf of her husband and herself, Deanna presented a cheque toward the establishment of the QLG.

Shannon Miller (mother of Kaiti Perras, one of the victims) thanked all Calgarians for their support of the five families and of the QLG. Shannon highlighted the fact that this will be "the first outdoor musical garden in Canada" and that part of its intent is "to inspire wellness".

Mayor Naheed Nenshi spoke of "those five wonderful kids full of thoughts of community ... imaginers who wanted to bring people together—and here they are doing just that".

Tony Tighe then invited the parents to take up five golden shovels which they used to symbolically turn the sod for the QLG. As Mayor Nenshi observed, "Because of this park, people will remember your kids forever". Truly a final note of joy, optimism, and moving ahead.

CanSkate (Learn-to-Skate) Program

The CanSkate Program is Skate Canada's learn-to-skate program designed for beginner skaters, ages 4 & up that focuses on the development of fundamental skating skills and movements. Our program encourages skaters to learn in a fun, safe, positive environment while receiving constant feedback from our Coaching team for better progression. During the skating season, Coaches will use their discretion to progress skaters through appropriate CanSkate levels according to their skating ability. Those who show potential and interest may choose to join the STARSkate (Intro to Figure Skating) group lesson programs.

STARSkate (Intro Figure Skating) Program

The Junior Group Star Program (STAR 1-2 levels) and the Junior Star Program (STAR 3-5) under the STARSkate framework, is designed for skaters who have completed CanSkate Stage 4 or higher or for those who have progressed beyond the CanSkate program and would like to continue progressing in group lessons. Our program motivates skaters to learn in a group environment and progress at their own pace while developing their figure skating in Singles Skating, Skating Skills and Ice Dance. Skaters immersed in this program will have the opportunity to begin their Skate Canada STAR 1-5 Assessments through a Nationally standardized testing system and have the opportunity to attend STAR 1-5 Competitions.

Beginner Group Star Program - New!

This program is for all beginner skaters ages 6 and over for any skating discipline such as hockey, figure skating and ringette.

Skaters in this program can learn the fundamental skating skills focusing on Balance, Control and Agility. Skaters can choose to be in both the Beginner Group Star Program and the CanSkate Program at the same time.

Competitive Skate (Figure Skating) Program

The Competitive Skate program is for skaters in singles, pair and ice dance wishing to compete in qualifying events within Skate Canada. Skaters who wish to challenge their figure skating skills and who show potential as competitive skaters can participate in this program. This is the main competitive figure skating stream for those skaters who would like the opportunity to compete at Sectionals, Skate Canada Challenge and the Canadian National Figure Skating Championships. If skaters are interested in competitive figure skating, they can join the Competitive Skate Program through their Coach.

Adult /Teen Skate Program

The Adult Skate Program is growing in popularity and offers recreational, test and competitive opportunities to Adult skaters 18 years and over. The Adult group lessons teaches from basic to advanced levels of skating skills and movements and allows skaters to learn in a fun, social environment.

Each year the Marda Loop Justice Film Festival strives to present innovative and meaningful documentaries that encourage Calgarians to take positive action in their communities, this nation, and the world.

Synopsis: Following his Oscar winning *The White Helmets*, Orlando von Einsiedel turns his camera on his own family as they attempt to cope with a devastating loss.

When his brother, Evelyn, newly diagnosed as schizophrenic and suffering from intense depression, took his own life at 22, Orlando and his other two siblings buried the trauma, rarely talking about it. Over a decade later, the remaining family set out on a hiking tour, visiting landscapes Evelyn liked to walk, to reflect on his life and death. The result is an intensely personal and moving take on the emotional impact of suicide within a family and a powerful account of the benefits of creating safe spaces for emotional communication.

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Backyard Play Safety

Emergency Medical Services (EMS) would like to encourage parents and caregivers to ensure their backyard play areas are made safe for children. Although direct supervision is the best method to reduce the chance of injury, ensure your play equipment in your yard is in good repair and is suitable for the age and skill of the children using it. Check play equipment often; replace or repair any worn or broken parts. Set up play equipment over top a 9-inch layer of shock-absorbing material such as sand, wood chips, or pea gravel which extends 6 feet out in all directions from the play area.

Water hazards

- Drowning contributes to unintentional injury-related death among children ages one to four;
- Children can drown in just a few centimetres of water if it covers their mouth and nose;
- Ensure all backyard swimming pools are fenced. The fence must be at least 1.8 metres (*) high and have a self-latching, self-closing, lockable gate.

(*Alberta Building Code)

Lawn and garden tools

- Keep young children away from outdoor power equipment;
- Serious burns may result from touching hot engine surfaces;
- Ensure that all sharp tools, fuel, chemicals, and other hazardous substances are stored in a secure, locked area. A simple latch may not be sufficient.

Insect bites and stings

- Minimize the risk of attracting insects by not wearing strong perfumes or scented lotions;
- Avoid wearing brightly coloured clothing outdoors;
- Consider destroying or relocating hives and nests situated near your home;
- To avoid injury through inadvertently stepping on a stinging insect always wear footwear outdoors;
- If your child has received an 'EpiPen, Junior' prescription from your physician (for anaphylactic reactions only) ensure they understand when and how to use it;
- If your child experiences a severe reaction to an insect sting, or other environmental cause, seek medical attention, or call 9-1-1.



News from the Friends of Nose Hill

All areas in natural environment parks, including asphalt pathways, are on-leash unless in an off-leash area with a sign. City Parks is doing some restoration work on Nose Hill, a major natural environment park. The aim is to preserve the park's native grassland communities by managing invasive species (weeds), reducing erosion and the overall footprint of "undesignated" trails. When enjoying the park, please keep on designated trails as much as possible, indicated by the trail markers. Keep dogs on leash when not in the multi-use zone (on the plateau or top of the hill). This will help to reduce wildlife encounters and protect your pets.

Calgary has one of the highest amounts of green space of any city in North America. An estimate is that there are more than 693 natural areas which are over 50% of the park space in Calgary. Natural parks are mainly native animals and plants (or "naturalization"). These parks play a role in protecting Calgary's wildlife with habitat for local and migratory animals. Compared with ornamental parks, natural areas give priority to the protection of vegetation and wildlife over human use, when the two come into conflict.

The Natural Area Management Plan, one of the first in Canada, offers guidelines for managing natural parks in Calgary. Some techniques for improving natural parks are erosion control, weed control, and planting native vegetation. Other park management issues are animal control, wildlife encounters, encroachments (such as forts), and vandalism.

Our Natural Area Management Plan, completed in 1994, was developed to protect natural areas. It establishes overall policy for the protection, management, public use and enjoyment, purchase, and stewardship of Calgary's nature. While year-round enjoyment and use will be encouraged, there must be sensitivity to environmental impact and safety. Where recreational use and the long-term survival of significant habitats conflict, protection of the resource will be first.

Keeping you on the move: Online map shows Calgary's traffic information

- Large metal items (e.g. lawnmowers, barbecues)
- Rail way ties
- Sod or dirt (other yard waste is OK)
- Household hazardous waste
