

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

Dear Brentwoodians,

Living in a big city can often put people out of touch with our natural surroundings, but even if you have become accustomed to the birds, squirrels, and hares that live in our neighbourhood, this summer has provided plenty of reminders that the wild world is often right outside our doors.

Brentwood and the surrounding communities have been visited (and in some cases, seemingly occupied) by bobcats, deer, and even moose this summer. Anecdotally, it seems like a bumper year for bear warnings in the mountain parks, and at least one ursine scrounger has been spotted inside the city limits.

Incursions of wildlife into our built environment create mixed reactions: these encounters can create concerns for the safety of pets, children, and the wild animals themselves, but I also find myself reassured that no matter how we hem ourselves in with buildings and parking lots and busy roads, the natural world always reminds us that it is never very far removed, and that whether we like it or not we remain connected with the environment we live in.

That said, please be safe and look out for pets and small children, whether in your neighbourhood, local parks, or in the wilderness. The Alberta Ministry of Environment offers some resources for urban wildlife encounters at alberta.ca/living-with-wildlife.aspx.

As the days grow shorter and the evenings cooler, we take

time to reflect on our recent gardening season. It was challenging in many ways - the severe cold in early spring which froze the growth in many of our perennials and forced us to cancel our scheduled spring cleanup; the persistent rain throughout the spring and summer which aided plants but also encouraged a bumper crop of weeds; and a short but very destructive hail event resulting in the loss of many of our cherries and apples, and an abrupt end to most of our rhubarb. Fortunately, the hail came early, and some plants had time to recover. Many surviving cherries and apples were battered by the hail and then attacked by the birds, but they continued to grow and ripen in the warm days of late August (see photo). We were also grateful for the absence of smoke from forest fires which had been a significant air pollution problem in the two prior summers, often interfering with our ability to keep the garden looking tidy and weed free.

August was the month when all of the annuals in the perimeter beds and our planters came into their own with brilliant red and pink poppies, intermingled with variably coloured marigolds, fragrant sweet peas and alyssum, calendulas, cosmos, and myriad other unnamed flowers grown from pollinator seed mix packages. With vegetables in the garden beds partially harvested and the dark soil exposed, we can still enjoy the colour provided by our annual flowers. A few of the later blooming perennials, including the fall asters and the day lilies, also continue to enhance the appearance of the garden, but the tall, elegant, deep blue delphiniums are largely past.

Our August garden cleanup was held on a Thursday evening and was well attended. Our compost was screened and generously spread over the strawberry patches and around several trees and bushes, returning vital nutrition back into the soil. We are now looking forward to our Harvest Potluck, our main social event of the year, where we celebrate the end of the season.

DEVELOPMENT AND TRANSPORTATION COMMITTEE (DTC)

What if I have a problem in the neighbourhood?

The Brentwood Community Association (BCA) sometimes receives calls or emails from residents who have a problem and are wondering what to do. The nature of the problems can be diverse, ranging from parking issues, traffic (speeding), property upkeep (weeds or unkept lawns, snow removal or "messy" properties), noise (barking dogs, parties), or even wildlife (bobcats in the area).

Sometimes the BCA can directly contact someone to address the issue. For example, we have a Community Resource Officer from Calgary Police Services, and a Neighbourhood Partnership Coordinator through the City of Calgary. We may also contact our city councillor, Sean Chu, or one of his staff members. We can pass on the information to them and sometimes they can advise us or resolve the issue directly.

If not, then what?

First, can you address the problem directly? Ideally, talk to the responsible person / homeowner. Make sure they are aware of your concern and give them a chance to fix the problem. If there are problems that a conversation does not solve, the appropriate way to deal with them is through 311 at the City of Calgary.

From the City of Calgary website: "311 Citizen Services is your single point of contact for local government information and non-emergency services. Whether you're a resident, a business owner, or a visitor, your connection to the City is at your fingertips."

Note that generally you cannot call most City departments directly, but 311 can advise you or forward your request. The City of Calgary wants 311 to be the entry point to all of its services and departments, so this really is the way to start. 311 operates 24 hours a day, through phone calls (dial 311), online submissions, or via mobile app. They will transfer your service request to the appropriate department for action.

Note also that Bylaw works on a complaint basis only. Contacting 311 is the only way to register a complaint and seek action to resolve the issue. If you say nothing, then nothing can (or will) be done. Bylaw officers do not drive around looking for unkempt properties, illegal secondary suites, or barking dogs, but they will respond if a complaint is received.

Many people have told me that they don't want to complain, they don't want to be on record, and they don't want to "tell on" someone. All 311 reports are private and confidential. The mobile app allows for anonymous submissions, but depending on the complaint, if you provide your name and address, you may receive follow-up information or be able to track your request. You will be asked to provide a password and given a tracking number so that you are the only one who can request information about any follow-up on the complaint.

If you are unsure as to what the bylaws are with regards to noise, fire pits, pets, untidy properties or other issues, enter "Good Neighbour Practices Reference Guide" on the City of Calgary website (https://www.calgary.ca/CSPS/ABS/Documents/Bylaws-by-topic/Good-Neighbour-Practices-Reference-Guide.pdf)

This guide is full of practical information. What time can you start a leaf blower on a Saturday morning? Where can your downspouts drain water? Can you park an RV in front of your house? Does your dog need a license?

If you see a problem, it is likely that other neighbours do as well, and it benefits everyone to have the issue resolved. It also sets an expectation for all property owners that they must maintain their property and comply with bylaws. Finally, if there truly is a problem property or owner, calls to 311 are the only way to ensure that there is a record of complaints. A bylaw officer will investigate, and fines or penalties can be levied if necessary.

If you are interested in community planning and redevelopment issues, we welcome new members to join us. We meet at 7:00 p.m. on the first Monday of every month in the Sportsplex Boardroom. 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Cale Makar Links Brentwood to the NHL

If you watched the Stanley Cup playoffs this past spring, you'll recall that the Calgary Flames lost out to the Colorado Avalanche in the first round. One of the lead scorers for the Avalanche was Cale Makar—a 20-year-old with some strong Brentwood connections.

Cale grew up in nearby Varsity, but attended Sir Winston Churchill High School, which was a family reunion of sorts: two of his uncles are teachers there, and some of his cousins were schoolmates. Brentwood was also home to Cale's "Nana", and he enjoyed visits to her home, especially at Christmastime.

Cale learned to play hockey by the age of 4, working his way into the Calgary Minor Hockey program as a defenceman. In his Bantam years, Cale played with the Triple A Flames, where team Assistant Coach Brad Hunt (full disclosure here—Brad is my nephew) remembers Cale as "a player who worked hard. He always pushed himself to become the best player he could be. He had a great attitude and was a good teammate."

Triple A Team Manager, Fred Hunt, (that would be my brother), describes Cale as "having a strong work ethic and a calm demeanour." He adds: "Cale keeps everything in perspective, which will serve him well as he becomes a top rookie in the league and as he goes through the inevitable ups and downs with his game and his team."

This calm demeanour carries over to Cale's day-to-day life. When I asked him how he felt about being awarded the Hobey Baker Award for most valuable player in the NCAA, and then going straight into the Stanley Cup Playoffs, Cale replied, "It hasn't really hit me yet." He definitely took note that at the NHL level, "the play is more physical and speedier... the game has more edge."

Cale's humility is also evident as he reflects on his play, saying, "I'm not a one-man show. I've had so much support and so many people to thank over the years for all of their support". There are far too many people for Cale to list, but his grandparents attended almost every single game that Cale played in his early hockey years. I suspect that his parents, Gary and Laura, along with Cale's younger brother Taylor, were also at most of those games cheering him on.

When I asked Cale what advice he might give to young athletes reading this article, he promptly replied "be versatile and seek balance". He expanded on those qualities by suggesting that kids try out a variety of sports and other pursuits. For example, he himself is an avid golfer. At college in Boston (where he has been studying Sport Management), he has volunteered reading books to children and playing fun floor hockey with them. Cale has also participated in a number of charity events over the years.

At the time of our interview, Cale was getting ready to head to the Avalanche training camp in mid-September. I know that Brentwoodians will wish Cale a great new NHL season – though perhaps he could take it a bit easier on our hometown Flames?



At this time, we are planning our annual general meeting. Details about our guest speaker will be posted on our website at www.fonhs.org. All are welcome to attend, and admission is free. We also post documents about Calgary residents who helped to save Nose Hill and Fish Creek Park.

City Council asked staff to submit an application to designate Calgary as a Bee City no later than the end of 2019. The City did restoration work in a natural area to improve wild-life habitat and increase biodiversity. An endangered species of bumblebee was discovered. This means the species, which was only otherwise seen in northern Alberta and in a small area in the Yukon, is at risk of disappearing from the Canadian wilderness.

The mandate of the Biodiversity Policy is to restore open space, increase biodiversity, and promote flora and fauna in Calgary communities. There are benefits to pest control, pure water, climate, and the environment. Eco resilience commits to plan, protect, manage, and restore open space. Ecosystems should be productive, diverse, and healthy in order to recover from disturbance and adapt to change.

Bee City Canada helps pollinators on both public and private land. There have been declines around the globe, due to habitat loss, disease, pesticides, and parasites. Organizations, schools, businesses, campuses, as well as other cities, towns, and First Nations across the country have applied and been granted special status. The City of Airdrie, which is the 23rd Bee Canada City, has an urban beekeeping pilot and a community orchard.

Pollinators, such as bees, beetles, bats, butterflies, hummingbirds, and flies play a major role in sustaining the world's plant species. Native trees, shrubs, grasses, vines, grasses, and flowering plants ("forbs") are being planted in parks and open spaces. There are steps taken to provide nesting areas for cavity and ground nesting bees.

National Pollinator Week celebrates the fact that 75%+ of our flowering plants and nearly 75% of our crops are helped by pollinators. (Blueberries, almonds, squash, chocolate, and coffee all depend on them). Participants are asked to choose plants which bloom, one during the spring, one in summer, and the last in fall. These programs are free. For more information go to: beecitycanada.org/.

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
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
